Even if you want to post the clip as it was filmed, putting the footage through a video editing kit allows you the power and freedom to clean things up a little bit. Some possible things you can do with the first video editing project is add fade and disappear to the clip. To do this, you'll need to use the Multiple Effects option to select the appropriate fade (fading out of black, fading out of white, fading to black, fading to white). You can find this option on the Visual Effects tab, click the drop-down arrow in the Effects panel, and then click Multiple Effects. Try it first, and then start researching more complex effects. Try to make the cross dissolve between two clips. Try adjusting the sound levels of the clip. Try adjusting the brightness, hue, and saturation. The bottom line is, look at what your platform is capable of and get experiments. Once you're comfortable, try creating a video with the beginning, middle and end, consisting of multiple video clips. Add transitions throughout - or leave hard cuts when you're not changing scenes - then adjust the color of the clips and try to balance the sound level.
